What does ICT4D Cambodia Network member do?

- empower women's organizations in Cambodia to use information and communication technologies (ICTs)

- There were 379 questionnaires to be filled by 108
 Communes/ Sangkats Councilors in Phnom Penh,
 Kompong Thom, Siem Reap, Battambang province.
 Now, There are 297 questionnaires have been collected.
- Data from the questionnaires have seen entry into the Limesurvey.

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Problem Identification:

- Young men and women comprise 33% of the total population in Cambodia; it is thus fair to say that they are one of Cambodia's greatest assets to achieve progress and development.
- Youth are considered as agents of change and the future of a country (Cambodia Population Census 2008).
- However, in Cambodia, 54% of eligible youth in the 2007 commune council did not vote and 21% of eligible youth voters were not registered.

- Problem Identification (conti.)
 - The statistics of 2007 indicated that youth participation is still limited in the Cambodian space of the democratic process, especially in understanding their right to vote and their responsibility to promote good governance.
 - Youth lack enough encouragement and means to express their ideas about the elections, human rights, good governance, as well as other fundamental topics. When they become involved in activities related to human rights, elections, and democracy, they often remain as passive supporters rather than as active decision-makers.

- Problem Identification (conti.)
 - Youth view themselves as having a limited role in the elections and the democratic process rather than viewing themselves as major players with rights and responsibilities.
 - They believe that the responsibility to bring about positive change and to further build democracy lies among their leaders.
 - These beliefs in conjunction with a lack of media literacy and a lack of access to information hinder youth's informed participation in the democratic process, during elections.

Project objectives:

Creating an enabling environment for a series of dialogue on democracy to Youth and the Commune /Sangkat councilors in Phnom Penh and in five provinces through the use of ICT for effective participation in democratic process.

Progress of project

- Training course on "Access to information with a Gender Perspective Approach" was held on 29-30 August in collaboration between the NLC/S and the Open Institute for youth and Commune Councilor.
- 2 Training courses on "Citizen Journalist" was held from 17-20 September and 27-29 March, 2013 to build capacity to councilors and Youth on how to write a piece of news, information and blogging related to good governance and democracy







Progress of Project

- 8 times partner meeting by 15 June 2012, 09 July 2012, 19 July 2012, 28 Aug, 2012, 16 Nov, 2012, 25 Dec, 2012, 19 and 25 Mar, 2012 discussed and updat the project implementation and progressive report.
- Organized a forum on "Youth Role in Strengthening Local Development and Local Governance" on 6 February 2013
- The forum "Youth and the 2013 National Election" was prepared and organized at the Open Institute on November 21, 2012
- Training on "Access to information" at 29-30 August 2012. There were 30 participants (17 females and 13 males)

 - Conducted Democracy Information Campaign (dialogue and youth involving social activities) on Facebook and twitter
 - Collaborated with Green Youth Assembly to organize the seminar on "Promoting Women in Development in Cambodia" on 7th March 2013 at Panhachet University.

 - These are two, one hour live call in shows with different topics through SARIKA FM 106.5 in Phnom Penh and FM 95.5 in Siem Reap on the topic of "Youth and Against Corruption" was broadcasted on Nov 12, 2012 and link to facebook. And another live show was done on Nov 22 on "Youth and Voting Register".
 - Based line group discussion in Phnom Penh at 30 August 2012.
 - Broadcast twice each month (second and fourth Thursday) during Sarika 106.5's popular "Let's Go" radio program. The program, which focuses on youth, is broadcast live each week between 9 am and 10 am

- Two, one-hour live radio talk shows on "Are the youth the respected role models of the law?" and "How to make the right decision on the election" broadcasted through Sarika FM 106.5 in Phnom Penh and FM 95.5 in Siem Reap.
- Another live talkshow is on "Youth and Responsibilities in Society" and "Disadvantages of youth's nonparticipation in election" broadcasted through Sarika FM 106.5 in Phnom Penh and FM 95.5 in Siem Reap in Feb, 2013.

- Conducted Democracy Information Campaign (dialogue and youth involving social activities) on Facebook and twitter.




Promoting Transparency through Open Data-EWMI

- Open Development Cambodia provides an online hub compiling freely available data in a 'one-stop shop' to consolidate up-to-date information about Cambodia, using an 'open data' approach.
- By making materials available to a wide range of users, ODC facilitates rational factbased dialogue, improved communication, strengthened policy-making, and better development planning between public, private, and international sectors

Promoting Transparency through Open Data-EWMI

- What is Open Development Cambodia?
 - ODC is an Open Data website which aggregates a wide range of economic and environmental data. This project is implemented by a Cambodian team, was conceived by EWMI and has received support by SPIDER.
- ODC website is based on the simple premise that information collected for public interest should be publicly available without restrictions.

Promoting Transparency through Open Data-EWMI

- Progress of project
 - The ODC team has been continuously uploading news articles and video into the website. In April, ODC uploaded 155 news articles and 12 videos into the website.
 - The team also built three new maps and updated 22 existing maps in March, 2013.
 - ODC and project partner Save Cambodia's Wildlife (SCW) joint working group with Conservation International (CI) and Fauna and Flora International (FFI) to generate ideas for creating biodiversity maps of Cambodia.

Promoting Transparency through Open Data-EWMI

- Progress of project
 - ODC shared recent development of the website, the launch of the online library, and the forthcoming plans to encourage data sharing that would be useful for the participating NGOs' work.
 - ODC mappers also coordinated with a climate change modeling expert at University of Can Tho to begin building out land use change maps

Interactive Voice Response Systems for Support of Women and Children-InSTEDD

- With support from SPIDER, InSTEDD is the excutive applicant to implment the and extend 'Verboice', an open-source tool which specializes in using interative voice response (IVR) to support health, safety, and sustainable development work.
- The project is to assist Women's Media Centre (WMC) and OI and other intersted parnter to implement a series of mobilebased information telephone hotlines, reach of their current mass media projects.

Progress of project


- The 'Election Hotlines' (a cooperation project between Cambodia's National Election Committee (NEC) and OI), and Loy9 (a BBC Media Action Program focuses on engaging youth in local and national decision making) were launched using Verboice platform.
- Working with Marrie Stopes clinic Chbar Ampov that Marrie Stopes arranged to test Verboice content they created with their clinic midwives to get their feedback.
